Message from the Program Chair



It is a great pleasure to invite you to attend the 2011 Annual Scientific Congress of the American College of Phlebology. This occasion will mark the silver anniversary for this educational endeavor and promises to bring the perfect blend of scientifically stimulating content and social atmosphere to gather with friends in the phlebology community.

The planning committee has been greatly involved in integrating a paradigm shift, assuring consistency with the American College of Phlebology's ACCME accreditation. The rigors of the committee's efforts assure our compliance with ACCME standards, the fruits of which permit an ever more stimulating curriculum combined with more hours of activity that are CME eligible. The rigors of complying with ACCME standards serve to bring quality presentations without concern for bias. International and national experts on special topics in phlebology have been selected to provide their expertise.

What is new in 2011?

- This year marks the first that diplomates of the American Board of Phlebology will be required to begin accruing maintenance of certification (MOC) hours. The annual congress has programmed content consistent with that required for the ABPh self-assessment modules (SAM). This will enable ABPh diplomates to begin accruing SAM credits.
- · Special interest sessions have been formatted to offer progressive content over a two-day period. Topics will include emerging technologies, insurance concerns and professional marketing advice, among others.
- Pre-congress activities will offer both basic and advanced phlebology tracks, in addition to timely practice management and ultrasound pathways. The advanced track will approach more sophisticated topics, combining the didactic experience with deep vein workshops. Space will be limited and early registration is recommended.
- · Research activities involving the solo practitioner may seem daunting. In an effort to continue initiatives put forth by the college, a research symposium will be held in an effort to to identify and recruit potential investigators to complete meaningful research in phlebology. The forum is to be both didactic and interactive, addressing important topics in the field. If you have wanted to participate in clinical research but did not know where to begin, this symposium is a great place to start.

General Session Highlights

This year we will be offering TWO keynote presentations:

- Venous ulcers occur at epidemic proportions throughout the world, yet despite the ESCHAR trial, significant controversy exists regarding the timing of treatment for superficial reflux. Dr. Bill Marston and Tom O'Donnell will debate this topic in detail Friday morning and offer attendees the opportunity to share their opinions at the completion of this event.
- Details of health care reform are cloudy at best, but are there directions we should take as phlebologists to secure a position or voice at the table? Dr. David Flum is a general surgeon dedicated to outcomes based research. He is well versed in phlebology and was recently appointed to the methodology committee for the Patient Centered Outcomes Research Institute. Dr. Flum will offer a lively discussion Saturday morning, sharing his unique view of phlebology and opportunities for our field of practice.

TRACK A - BASIC PHLEBOLOGY AND CLINICAL PEARLS: A HOW-TO GUIDE FOR YOUR PRACTICE

Following the track, the participant should be able to:

- Identify potential thrombophilic risk factors for otherwise healthy patients in a routine venous history and physical examination


